SUSTAINABLE CITIES AND COMMUNITIES

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This report covers the development of a sustainable, accessible and livable campus at Ege University within the scope of sustainable implementation goals and the protection of our natural and cultural heritage. The vision of Ege University is to be a world university that is a pioneer in scientific research, has a strong cooperation and communication network with its stakeholders in the national and international arena, is student-oriented, has a green, sustainable, accessible and livable campus, contributes to economic, social and cultural life and has a strong financial structure. Ege University adopts the Sustainable Green Campus policy, which prioritizes environmental awareness in all activities of the university, carries out environmental activities in this direction, and aims to make sustainability a culture of life for its students and employees during and after the education and training period.

According to the "Sustainable Green University Strategic Plan" published in 2016, Ege University continues to work towards a sustainable green university management system and the provision of environmentally friendly campus transport services..

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PUBLIC BUILDINGS

Ege University's buildings of historical and cultural value, educational and research buildings and open spaces, including natural heritage, cultural centers and art houses are open to public access.

Among the buildings of historical and cultural value are the Ege University Ethnographic Museum and the Ege University Museum of Paper and Book Arts. Activities such as visual presentations, exhibitions, conferences, workshops and workshops are organized in these museums.

The Paper and Book Arts Museum, which hosts approximately 500 visitors a month, is the first paper and book museum in Turkey. The museum has a unique position in the international arena as a university museum where the subject is handled in this dimension and richness. In the museum, you can feel the long journey of paper and books, indispensable fixtures of the last 2000 years of world cultural history and find examples from different cultures.



The Ethnography Museum building was built between the late 19th and early 20th centuries. In the wedding house section of the museum, the phenomenon of henna night, dowry exhibition, wedding dinner preparations and dowry writing in the traditional wedding practices of the 19th century are revived in a traditional İzmir house environment.

In order to ensure the sustainability of traditional professions, woodworking, shoemaking, copper processing and tailoring professions are revived in the museum.

The museum, which hosts various workshops throughout the year, also organizes workshops for children. In the Toy Workshop organized in 2022, children designed their own toys using recycled materials. Children who made their own toys while developing their creativity enjoyed playing with toys.



Among the buildings that harbour natural heritage and have an educational and research nature are Ege University Natural History Museum, Ege University Observatory, Ege University Botanical Garden and Herbarium. These buildings and the botanical garden can be visited, and events are organized to attract the public's interest and to introduce nature with all its evidence to the public more closely.



The Natural History Museum in the structure of the Natural History Application and Research Centre is the second largest Natural History Museum established in Turkey after the Natural History Museum in the General Directorate of Mineral Research and Exploration in Ankara. It is also Turkey's first academic museum in the structure of a university with its Master's Degree Program in the Department of Natural History under the Department of Natural Sciences and its staff conducting research in the field of natural history.



Ege University Botanical Garden and Herbarium is visited by approximately 10,000 students from different levels every year for educational purposes, and during their visits they are given introductory and informative presentations by the center staff and students of the Department of Botany, Department of Biology. Ege University Botanical Garden, which contains more than 3,000 plant specimens, is a green area open to the public.



Since 2012, informative seminars have been held in the botanical garden between March and June, once a week or once every two weeks, by lecturers invited from Turkey or abroad or public officials working in different institutions.



Every year, our garden hosts approximately 10-15 thousand school visitors with appointments and approximately 5 thousand visitors without appointments.



Panels and exhibitions are organized at different times to raise awareness on biodiversity, especially for secondary and higher education students.

The buildings where social, cultural and scientific events are held include Ege University **Prof. Dr. Yusuf VARDAR MÖTBE Cultural Centre**, **Ege University Culture and Art House** and **Ege University Atatürk Cultural Centre**. These buildings host events organized by student societies, graduation ceremonies and professional events and are open to public access.



Prof. Dr. Yusuf VARDAR MÖTBE Cultural Centre, which is a part of the cultural identity of Ege University, aims to create a dynamic campus environment intertwined with culture and art for everyone from Ege University and especially for university students by bringing art to the campus.



MÖTBE, which is the first building of our campus, was opened on 10 September 1968. Our center has a large hall with a capacity of 728 people, a seminar hall for 40 people and an art gallery where exhibitions are held regularly. While hosting exhibitions and works such as painting, sculpture and handicrafts, it is also open to visitors. In 2022, 105 events were held at MÖTBE.

Ege University has 18 faculties, 3 colleges and 11 vocational schools. In the foyer areas of these units, various exhibitions and shows are held. These events are also open to the public.

The House of Culture and Arts, which hosts professional events as well as the events prepared by the student communities of our university, offers events such as film screenings, theatre and dance performances, concerts, seminars and interviews free of charge to everyone from Ege with its hall and foyer area with a capacity of 306 people, which was prepared for 154 people in accordance with the social distance measures taken within the scope of Covid19. In 2022, 236 events were held at the House of Culture and Arts.





The Atatürk Cultural Center is one of the oldest and most important cultural centers in Izmir, where scientific and artistic activities of Ege University and institutions and organizations in Izmir are held. The center has two large halls, one with a capacity of 652 people and the other with a capacity of 624 people, as well as a 340-seat theatre hall, a 470 m2 art gallery, and a large foyer area for 800 people. In 2022, 399 events were held at the Atatürk Cultural Centre.

Ege University Faculty of Medicine Hospital, which provides health services to the public within the Ege University campus, is a well-equipped hospital located on the campus and provides health services to the public.



Ege University Faculty of Dentistry is considered an A-plus hospital that provides world-class health care services in terms of patient service in Turkey and has national accreditation.

OBSERVATORY RESEARCH AND APPLICATION CENTRE

Ege University Observatory has been the laboratory of the Department of Astronomy and Space Sciences since its establishment. Education and training services are provided to undergraduate and graduate students of the department. Observation and measurement opportunities are provided to the researchers of the department, especially to the researchers of similar departments in other universities. Publications based on the results of scientific research are made.



The Observatory also undertakes the task of introducing and popularizing astronomy and science to the public. For this purpose, Science - Society Activities are organized. Visiting programs and science education activities are organized for everyone interested in astronomy, providing information about celestial events, celestial bodies, and the structure of the universe. In addition, various activities are organized for all segments of society on special days during the year when important celestial events occur.





On the other hand, institutional visits, with priority given to educational institutions, are accepted within the framework of a specific program. In addition to scientific studies, Visiting Events, Public Days and Observation Festivals are also organized within the scope of Science-Community Activities. Consultancy services are also provided to institutions and individuals for the installation of telescopes and domes. All kinds of devices, equipment and goods (telescopes, experimental tools, educational visuals, etc.) are provided by our institution during the events.



OPENING LIBRARIES TO PUBLIC USE

The principles for users to benefit from Ege University libraries are determined by the Directive of Ege University Rectorate Library and Documentation Department. Ege University Central Library, located on the Ege University campus, shares its printed materials with the public, the university's database and the university's publications with Ege University staff and students. Members and students of Ege University can benefit from the free borrowing service of the library's printed resources, provided that they are members. E.U. staff and students can access the electronic resources of the library free of charge from off-campus.

The Central Library, which constantly enriches its digital and printed publications, language learning packages and database resources, provides 24/7 service to students during midterm and final exams. The library has many facilities such as wireless internet access, a computer lounge, an audio book recording studio, group study rooms, and individual study areas.



It is sufficient to be a member to benefit from Ege University Central Library.

The library, which is also in an important position with its facilities for the disabled, has 5 audio book recording studios. In these studios, academic books and all kinds of teaching materials that disabled users need are described and dubbed. Visually impaired users can listen to and record electronic teaching materials with their own devices.


The library, whose capacity and usage rate has tripled, is open all the time, providing students with the comfort of home during midterm and final semesters. Students' needs such as tea, pastry, soup and water while studying at night are also met free of charge.

Ege University Library and Documentation Department was awarded the Access to Space Orange Flag in 2021 and the Access to Space Orange Flag in 2022.



Apart from Ege University Central Library, there are 4 specialized libraries included in the Central Library automation system. These are Faculty of Medicine Library, Turkish World Institute Prof. Dr.Fikret TÜRKMEN Library, Çeşme Tourism and Hotel Management Faculty Library, State Turkish Music Conservatory Library.

OPENING MUSEUMS TO PUBLIC USE



Faculty of Pharmacy Süleyman Ferit Eczacıbaşı Pharmacy is open to visitors every Friday between working hours.



Public access is provided to museums, exhibition spaces and galleries or works of art at Ege University. During the museum week, activities such as talks, concerts and workshops are organised.

OPENING OF GREEN AREAS TO PUBLIC USE

Ege University has implemented the "Pedestrian Priority Green Campus Project" in order to ensure a sustainable campus life and to create a clean environment awareness.

Guests visiting the cultural centers, museums, exhibition areas of faculties and conference halls within the Ege University Campus can visit the green areas of the campus.



E. U. Guesthouse, which operates for the accommodation of guests coming to Ege University, serves with the comfort of a hotel, while the restaurant provides a resting place with its large and green garden.

The guesthouse restaurant is open to the public between 09:30-23:30 except on public holidays, religious holidays, and Mondays of the week with a rich menu of Turkish cuisine. In Guesthouse Restaurant, mixed breakfast, cocktail service for 850 people, a banquet for 400 people, engagement, wedding, henna night, and collective meal organizations are held.

Ege University continued its Greenmetric success by ranking 4th among public universities in Turkey and 108th in the world in the "World Green Universities-Greenmetric" ranking in 2022.



Members of the sports facilities open to the public within the Ege University campus (students, administrative and academic staff and external users) can use the grass football fields and green areas of the campus, which are open sports areas. The Healthy Life Running Trails, which are open to the public within the Ege University campus, are tartan-floored running tracks in a forested area.

In order to contribute to the students and staff to become physically and mentally healthy, highly self-confident, socially active successful individuals, and to make sports a part of their lives, our sports fields have been made open to the public.



CONTRIBUTION TO FINE ARTS AND CULTURAL HERITAGE

In 2022, there are one-off programs (dance show, concert, recital, recital, theatre with dance, workshop, educational work, exhibition, workshop, interview, recital, presentation, conference, symposium) performed by Ege University. These performances are open to the public. Among the many evidence documents, social media addresses such as Instagram, Facebook and event posters for 107 events of Ege University State Turkish Music Conservatory and the event of Ege University Classical Turkish Music Choir were shown as evidence.

In 2022, 8 exhibitions were held at Ege University Atatürk Cultural Centre Art Gallery and 9 exhibitions were held at Ege University Prof. Dr. Yusuf VARDAR MÖTBE Cultural Centre Art Gallery. Visits to the art gallery are free of charge.



Ege University contributes to the local arts through one-off or continuous programs, such as annual public performances by the university choir, theatre group, orchestra and similar groups. Ege University has venues (cultural centers, event halls, and art galleries) where activities that contribute to fine arts and cultural heritage appealing to all segments of society are held.

ENREGISTRATION AND PROTECTION OF CULTURAL HERITAGE

Levantine houses constitute an important part of the architectural history of Izmir. These mansions were built by families of European origin, known as Levantines, who settled here for commercial purposes in parallel with the importance that Izmir gained from the 17th century onwards.



BIG HOUSE

It is known that there was a monastery in the early 18th century in the area where the E.U. Rectorate is located today. The one-story house, which was first built on this land by a Dutch immigrant, was purchased in the 1820s by James Whittall, one of the partners of the famous Whittall Company, who settled in Izmir for commercial purposes in 1817. Ownership of the house passed to the Giraud family, who were related to the Whittall family, in the 1930s. In 1960, the Big House was expropriated and transferred to the Treasury of the Republic of Turkey, after which it became the property of Ege University. The building still serves as the Rectorate Administrative Building.

WILKINSON MANSION

Wilkinson Mansion, one of the old Levantine houses of Bornova, was built in 1865 by James Whittall, who lived in the famous Big House of those years (E.Ü. Rectorate Building), for his daughter Jane who married Richard Wilkinson, Consul of Thessaloniki, Malaga and Manila. Opened in 1857, this pavilion, which was built as a result of the demolition of the horse hares located in the area between St. Mary Magdalene Church and the Great House, was used by the Wilkinson family for generations until 1985. In 1988 the family sold the mansion to the Filidis family and in 1997 it was expropriated for the use of Ege University.



LA FONTAINE MANSION

The La Fontaine Mansion is located opposite St Mary Magdalene Church, next to the Murat Mansion. The earliest recorded owner of the building is James La Fontaine (1881-1933). The mansion was purchased by Ege University from Ruby Gladys Whittall in 1963. In time, the mansion, which also served as the Institute of Social Sciences and the Dean's Office of the Faculty of Education on behalf of the University, serves as the E.U. Atatürk's Principles and History of Turkish Revolution Application and Research Centre and Museum after the restoration in 2010.

WELL HOUSE (BRITISH CLUB)

Located next to the grounds of the Great House, this building is also known as the "Well House" or the "English Club". The oldest recorded owner of this house is James La Fontaine, grandson of James Whittall (1819-1863), the owner of the Great House. In 1966 it was purchased for the university. The garden behind the building was integrated with the garden of the university rectorate after the sale. The building, which now houses the E.U. Women's Problems Application and Research Centre and the E.U. İzmir Application and Research Centre, was restored in 2011.



BALLIAN KINGHOUSE

The Levantine house, whose oldest recorded occupant is the Ballian Family, was built in the second half of the 19th century. The mansion, which attracts attention with its ceiling moldings and plaster decorations on the center, was purchased in 1900 by Esther Marian Giraud (Wilkinson), wife of Charlton James Giraud, from his wife Attilia Ballian and their children Marie, Laura, Alfred, Adelina and Albert, the heirs of industrialist Antoine Ballian. The building, which was expropriated and purchased for Ege University in 1970, has been used as a lodging house, nursing school, archive and E.U. Strategy Development Department.

BARDISBANIAN MANSION

Used in the last quarter of the 20th century, the building, now known as the Green Pavilion after the name Pandispanya Pavilion, is estimated to have been built in the last quarter of the 19th century by D. A. Bardisbanian, a merchant from Izmir. The building served as the Chair of Agricultural Management and Economics at the Faculty of Agriculture of E.U. between 1955 and 1972. After its renovation in 1986, the mansion served as a guesthouse for high-level visitors to the university for a while, and after the renovations in 1993 and 1995, it was used as a social facility serving as a cafeteria and restaurant within the university.



In addition to the Big House, other Levantine houses within Ege University also serve in the administrative, cultural and social activities of the university.



YELLOW PAVILION

Built at the beginning of the 20th century, there is no information about the owner or the first user of the mansion. The mansion attracts attention with its flamboyant fireplaces, the oval pool in front of it and the bust of Atatürk in the garden. Atatürk visited the mansion on 18 June 1926 and a bust of Atatürk by Austrian sculptor Heinrich Krippell was placed in the garden to commemorate this visit. The mansion, which was used as a guest house and the Faculty of Agriculture Lodge within Ege University, today serves as the Dean's Office of the Faculty of Economics and Administrative Sciences of E.U.



PASQUALI MANSION (BARRY MANSION)

The building, now known as the Bari Mansion, is thought to have been built in the mid-19th century. After the death of Giovanni Pasquali in 1925, the building, which was left to his wife and three surviving children René, Christine and Joseph, was expropriated by the Turkish Treasury in 1941 for the use of the Bornova Agricultural School. The mansion, which lost one third of its garden due to road widening works, now welcomes its guests as a restaurant with its beautiful garden.



SİRKEHANE

It is estimated that the building, which has survived to the present day under the name of Sirkehane, was built by a Greek family between the late 19th and early 20th centuries. The rear part of the building was used as a vinegar and pickle production area by the Chair of Food and Fermentation Technology of E.U. Faculty of Agriculture in the 1960s. With the restoration completed in 2010, the building was opened as the E.U. Ethnography Museum and is the first institutional museum in Turkey to be opened jointly with the Ministry of Culture within a university.

In 1990, Sirkehane, which was transferred from the Treasury of the Republic of Turkey to Ege University by way of barter, served as a residence until the 1990s. The building, a large part of which has been demolished in the last twenty years, started to operate as "E.Ü. Balkans and Anatolian Clothing Museum" as a result of the renovation completed on 22.06.2010. It was applied to the Ministry of Culture, and it was stated that there was no objection to opening it as a private museum under the supervision of the Ministry and it was approved on 02.11.2010 and it was named as "EGE UNIVERSITY ETHNOGRAPHY MUSEUM".



The actions taken within Ege University campus to prioritize pedestrian transport and ensure sustainable transport (walking, bicycles or other non-motorized vehicles, minibus pools, carpools, shuttle buses or public transport, motorbikes, scooters or mopeds or electric vehicles) are listed below. In this sense, it is planned to facilitate pedestrian access with maps placed on the campus.

SUSTAINABLE IMPLEMENTATION GOALS

Ege University provides affordable housing/lodging to its employees. Ege University housing units are of 4 types (A, B, C-lower, C-upper and D-type) and consist of a total of 146 units.



Ege University offers affordable housing accommodation to its students. Ege University Student Village is located within the Ege University campus.
